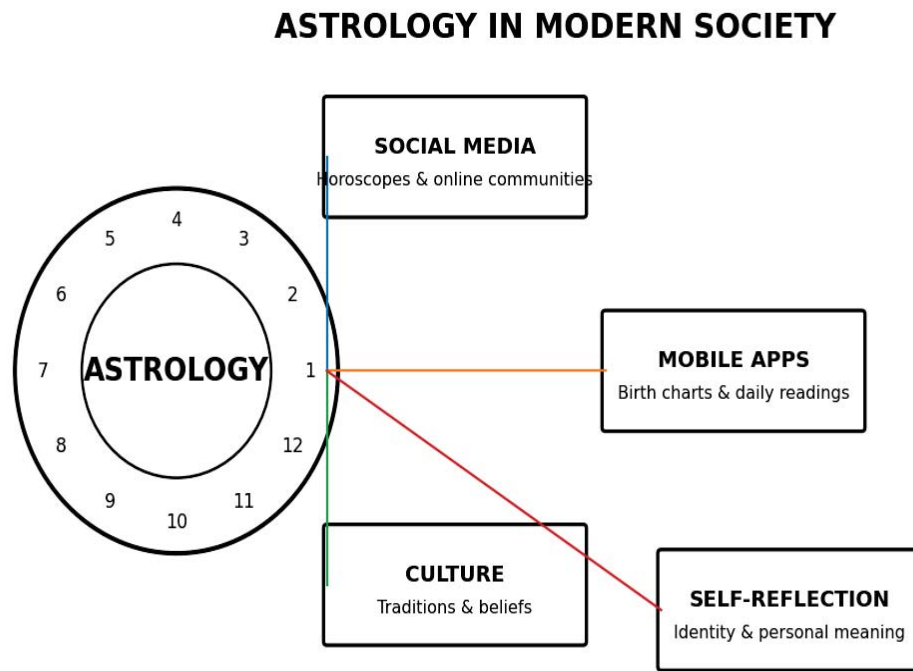


Figure 1. Astrology in modern society: beliefs, practices, and contemporary forms.
